Evolving With Our Community

As a community foundation, our core purpose is to serve and help improve a geographic region. We do this through grantmaking, leadership and donor stewardship, a multipronged approach that enables us to leverage both our own assets and other philanthropic resources for the good of the community. We are so fortunate and grateful to be able to do this work, and we are excited about what the future holds for both Greater Denver and Rose Community Foundation.

In 1995, Denver-area community leaders created Rose Community Foundation from the proceeds of the then-nonprofit Rose Medical Center's sale to a health care corporation. Largely influenced by Rose Medical Center itself, the founding values and vision that created the Foundation have guided it ever since, enabling us to make a meaningful impact in enhancing lives in the Greater Denver area. In 23 years, Rose Community Foundation has not significantly changed its priority areas or core functions, yet we know that both our region and its philanthropic funding landscape have changed significantly in the last two decades. As such, our board, committees and staff believe that we owe it to the community we serve – and everyone who worked so hard to build Rose Community Foundation's legacy to date – to ensure that we are meeting Greater Denver's evolving needs as effectively as possible. In 2019, we will begin a comprehensive strategic planning process with that singular goal in mind, and we are committed to inviting our partners and stakeholders along with

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FUNDHOLDERS MAKING AN IMPACT

NEW ROOTS & BRANCHES COHORT BEGINS

Each year, the members of Roots & Branches Foundation work together to understand Jewish traditions and values, explore community needs, and determine how to use grantmaking to help address an issue that resonates with them as young Jewish philanthropists. All members contribute their time, talent and money in support of their group's work.



The 19 members of Roots & Branches Foundation 2018 are a diverse and talented group of young Jewish adults who work in the nonprofit, tech, business and education fields. The 2017 cohort wrapped up this spring, having granted \$53,000 to programs, projects and organizations that welcome, support, and transform the lives of refugees and/or immigrants and their families.

COMMUNITY ACTION FUND GRANTMAKING

In June, we added our voice to the calls against the policies separating and detaining families at the U.S.-Mexico border. You can read our statement here. And we are grateful to have been able to put our money where our mouth is. Rose Community Foundation has granted \$260,500 in 2018 toward our Community Action Fund work, with additional grantmaking planned before the end of the year. Funding initiatives included grants to local nonprofit



organizations providing legal and interpretation services for immigrant and refugee children who are facing deportation, detention cases and removal proceedings in the Greater Denver area. Additionally, the current climate has resulted in increased demand being placed on many nonprofits who work with immigrant and refugee families and others vulnerable to hate, which inspired Rose Community Foundation to help address these capacity constraints under our Help the Helpers grant strategy. We have also provided funding to the Latino Community Foundation of Colorado and Together We Count, a new initiative focused on an accurate 2020 Census count to ensure Colorado receives its fair share of federal funding to support a variety of imperative community needs.

ROSE TEAM MEMBERS SOUGHT AFTER FOR NATIONAL LEADERSHIP POSITIONS

Recently, two of our program officers were invited to serve national organizations, which gives them a peer network for learnings from around the country to bring back to Greater Denver and helps elevate the work happening locally onto the national stage. Rose Community Foundation's Senior Program Officer for Education, Janet Lopez, joined the Grantmakers for Education national board and serves as the only representative both from Colorado and from a community foundation. Also this summer, Senior Program Officer for Child & Family Development, Elsa Holguín, was selected for the inaugural cohort of Hispanas Organized for Political Equality (HOPE) Nonpartisan & Binational Public Service Fellowship, an executive leadership program for outstanding Latina professionals who are poised to make urgent and long-lasting improvements in the lives of Latinas.
